JUDICIAL MERIT SELECTION DETAILS

- Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas and the Philadelphia Municipal Court.
 - Constitutional Amendment must be passed by two sessions of the General Assembly; approved by a statewide ballot question; and, approved by the voters of the City of Philadelphia.
 - Philadelphia Judicial Nominating Commission
 - Consists of 19 persons all residents of the City of Philadelphia.
 - Members should include men and women and reflect the civic, labor, business, geographic, political, economic, ethnic and racial diversity of the City of Philadelphia.
 - 1 appointed by the Philadelphia District Attorney
 - 1 appointed by the Philadelphia Chief Public Defender
 - 3 appointed by the Philadelphia Bar Association
 - 4 appointed by the Governor

- 2 appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate
- 2 appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate
- 3 appointed by the Democratic Party County Chair
- 3 appointed by the Republican Party County Chair
- The Philadelphia Judicial Nominating Commission shall only consider applicants for recommendation that
 - Are a member in good standing of the bar of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court;
 - Have engaged in the practice or teaching of law for at least 10 years; and,
 - Have demonstrated professional competence, judgement and integrity.
- The Governor may only nominate a person for Common Pleas or Municipal Court who has been recommended by the Nominating Commission.
- Each nominee for Common Pleas or Municipal Court must be confirmed by two-thirds of the members elected to the Pennsylvania Senate.
